










Theory of Change of the CARE 2020 Program Strategy

How will we know whether we are "on course" and advancing toward our impact intent and aspiration?




Indicators for the CARE approach:

Gender equality, inclusive governance and resilience

- # and % of people of all genders who have meaningfully participated in formal and informal decision-making spaces
- # of new or amended policies, legislation, programs, accountability spaces and/or budgets responsive to the rights of people of all genders
- # of effective and inclusive accountability spaces and processes established
- % of women represented in government at all levels
- Risk reduction measures and early warning systems accessible and used by vulnerable men, women and communities
- # and % of people adopting a wider variety of livelihood strategies or coping mechanisms



Article 25, UDHR

Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control.







ARTICLE 28, UDHR

Everyone is entitled to a social and international order in which the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration can be fully realized.
